SHCA 2014 AGM A Roaring Success!

The Sandy Hook Community Association's 2014 AGM on May 29th at the Sechelt Arts Centre could probably be described as a "roaring success." Featured speaker Kim Drescher, Bear Aware Community Coordinator for WildSafeBC (a program of the B.C. Conservation Foundation), covered several important safety tips for avoiding incidents with our furry neighbors (see below for details). Other speakers included SHCA President Valerie Nash, SHCA Treasurer Melanie Vallieres, and Charles

Ennis of the Royal Astronomical Society Sunshine Coast Centre.

President Nash opened by welcoming everyone and moving to the business section of the meeting. After members voted to accept the minutes of the 2013 AGM, she presented the 2013 - 2014 Annual Report

for the Association. Highlights included:

- Based on survey of residents, focus on emergency preparedness for the year.
- Newsletter articles provided information and other resources for emergencies.
- An emergency preparedness survey was designed and started to be distributed.
- SHCA sponsored a successful free basic emergency first aid class taught by Karin Apolzer for residents on July 4, 2013.
- We held our second community yard sale.
- The Sandy Hook Day picnic was the best attended ever and featured food, music, kids' contests, and boat rides on the Inlet.

- Our January 2014 Meet and Greet and Eat was also one of the best attended ever.
- We honored Past President and long-time Board member Gray Waddell for his service to SHCA and the residents of Sandy Hook.
- We honored District Parks Supervisor Perry Schmitt for his help and working with SHCA to improve the tot lot.
- SHCA Board members continued to monitor District meetings and represent SHCA at meetings of the Sechelt Community Association Forum.
- We communicated with the District on issues such as the paving of Skana Crescent, the proposed registration requirements for community associations, and other issues affecting Sandy Hook.
- We continued to communicate with residents through the newsletter, emails, posters, and flyers.

The next order of business was the presentation of the Financial Report for 2013 by Treasurer Melanie Vallieres; the members voted for acceptance of the report.

This was followed by the election of 2014 - 2015 Board members by the membership. Board members elected or re-elected for 2 year terms included:

part of the AGM, Board member Neil Edmunds introduced Kim Drescher from WildSafeBC. Kim's presentation included both ways to prevent conflicts with area wildlife (keeping food and garbage inaccessible, not using bird feeders, etc.) and important safety tips on what to do if you are confronted by wildlife. As she pointed out, each species (bears, cougars, and coyotes) needs a different response as well as a need to keep in control of the situation.

Recent incidents in Sandy Hook serve to underline Kim's advice. Bears are great climbers and bird feeders have proved attractive to one of our local bears who easily climbed onto a deck for food. In another post-AGM incident a mama bear climbed into a truck bed for some food inadvertently left there, and then sat on the truck's windshield.

President Nash introduced Charles Ennis of the Royal Astronomical Society Sunshine Coast Centre, who reviewed the history and programs of the Centre, including its outstanding speaker series and new telescope facility at the airport, and its planned July 26th Astronomy Night in Sandy Hook, starting at 9:00 PM in the tot lot (Skookumchuk and Deerhorn Roads). This fun and educational event is for everyone, including children, and will feature several telescopes for viewing the stars

and planets, as well as Centre members to point out viewable objects, explain what is being seen, and answer questions.

Spend An Hour, Save A Life

Your Sandy Hook Community Association sponsored its second free basic emergency first aid class for residents on June 2nd in the tot lot. Sandy Hook resident Karin Apolzer once again provided instruction in such techniques as cardiopulmonary resuscitation and

anti-choking measures. She also provided updates on recent recommended changes in using these techniques, as well as the differences in each method when applying them to children and infants.

After Karin explained and demonstrated each technique, attendees practiced on each other. Stuffed toys were used In place of children and infants.

Karin again emphasized that knowing what to do and using these techniques properly can save lives.



First-Ever Sandy Hook Star Party/Astronomy Night A Shining Hit!

The Sandy Hook Community Association and the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada's Sunshine Coast Centre cosponsored Sandy Hook's first-ever Astronomy Night/Star Party in the tot lot at the corner of Skookumchuk and Deerhorn Roads on Saturday, July 26th. Sandy Hook's Charles Ennis, Director at Large (Media Director) for the Centre, assembled a stellar crew and their high-powered telescopes to provide Sandy Hook residents and others with an outstanding educational and fun experience.

Fortunately, the weather cooperated with exceptionally clear skies and many people arrived early. The first event of the evening, starting about 7:30 PM, was observations of the sun's surface (our own star) and the spectacular solar flares. This year the sun has had an unusual amount of activity and huge solar storms have moved across its surface and into space. Society members noted that the solar flares observers could see were much bigger than the earth.

When twilight approached, more people (and dogs) arrived for the featured events. Participants included Sandy Hook residents, many children, plus others from Sechelt, Gibsons, Pender Harbor, and Roberts Creek, and even a couple from Pasadena, California.

As it got darker, the RASC members aligned their astronomical telescopes and the over 50 attendees lined up for more spectacular viewing. First visible were the planets Mars and Saturn. Viewers easily saw the "red planet" and the colorful surface and rings of Saturn. Soon more and more stars were visible and telescopes were adjusted so that viewers could see galaxies, the Milky Way, and unusual sights such as "binary" or double stars that rotate around each other. Children and adults were fascinated with both the observations and RASC members' enlightening explanations of what was being seen. Several of the members pointed out that their own interest in astronomy had started when they were children and had their first chance to view the planets and stars through telescopes. Many of those attending stayed

well past 11:30 PM. Those attending encouraged the Sandy Hook Community Association and the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada to repeat the Star Party here again soon.
